

To Israel, To Har Shalom, To Life! by Laurie Franklin

I'm writing this as I fly on the second of three flights that will take me to Israel for the first time. It doesn't seem quite real yet; I should be jumping out of my skin with excitement, but I'm not. Instead, I feel a great calm. It's time: it's the next step in a personal journey into Judaism that began when I moved to Missoula in 2002 and slowly and steadily became involved in the community life of Har Shalom.

This personal journey also led me to another "destination": serving as Har Shalom's lay leader. Last October at the Har Shalom annual meeting (heads up, the next one is August 29!), the membership voted to empower the Board to hire me as a part-time lay leader. Although we have had good experiences with the Hebrew Union College (HUC) rabbinic interns Ellie Steinman (Now Rabbi Steinman), Rachel Ackerman, and most recently, Callie Souther, the membership was ready to create a position for an in-house, local leadership presence and leave the HUC student rabbi program.

This spring, beginning May 15, I formally stepped into that new role. Boy, am I lucky! I'm honored to have gained the confidence and support of my fellow Har Shalomians over the last four years of service leading, officiating at life cycle events, celebrating holidays, and teaching and learning about Judaism.

I owe so much to Har Shalom for providing financial resources and encouragement to attend Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) music and leadership workshops. I'm also grateful to the URI for scholarships and mentoring. I thank Soul Train, the Israeli organization sponsoring me to participate in the Jewish leadership and Hebrew education trip in Israel (and sends us camp counselors, musicians, mimes, and filmmakers). I thank my partner, Sandy Ross, for supporting me as best friend, mate, and fellow traveler. Finally, I thank all of you who have shared your ideas, opinions, and dreams with me! In the coming year, we will think deeply, creatively, and joyfully to make community together; to learn, to pray, to dance, to work for peace and justice. Har Shalom is a place for all of us to explore our connection with Jewishness, no matter who we are, where we come from, and what we practice.

It is July and the hills and prairie are holding onto some green a little bit longer. Our attentions are turned outward - toward the lake, the river, the cooler forest, and the friends and family who are not as fortunate to experience this place the year through. something different to each one of us, but it probably includes more than one of the following elements – to be with fellow Jews at a Chanukah, Purim, or Passover gathering; joining in a Shabbat, High Holiday, or other ritual service; attending a cultural program with a Jewish artist or expert; connecting our children to Judaism through Atidaynu or summer camp; honoring our loved ones and departed family through attending a yizkor service, saying kaddish, or donating to the congregation; joining a social gathering with others in our community whether at Har Shalom, at a local park, or in a congregant's home; or representing Har Shalom to the broad Missoula and Western Montana communities through work on social justice. This list is far from complete.

Our board has been discussing all these in light of making our Jewish identity more communal. Is our building a way to identify who we are? What activities need to be strengthened, initiated, modified or terminated? Which efforts are possible or greatly enhanced by having a building? We welcome and encourage your participation and support in this journey.

You will be receiving a membership letter shortly. We have firmed up membership responsibilities of all congregants and the board and have laid out a plan to build a stronger base upon which to afford our building. Realities of the commitment we made to buy and stay in the building are not going away. There is still a lot of hard work to do. In truth the best way to bring peace, i.e. make whole, and peace of mind to this venture we call Har Shalom is to actively engage as individuals through participation and financial support and as a community through taking care of each other, honoring our traditions in the broadest sense of tsedakah, ritual and education, and building sustainable communities.

When you climb a mountain, float a river, share a summer spread, or photograph a wildflower, find a moment to include Har Shalom in your thoughts. Yahrzeits

The Yahrzeit is the anniversary of a loved one's death according to the Hebrew calendar. The civil date varies from year to year. The current year's civil date is listed first, followed by the Hebrew date, then the anniversary. Yahrzeit candles should be lit the evening before the date specified. This is because the Jewish day actually begins at sundown on the previous night. It is customary to make a donation to the synagogue in remembrance. May the memory of your loved ones be a blessing.
